
SNOW AND ICE! LATE SURPRISE

He always managed to keep all the sightings I had noted within the article by carefully reducing my ramblings. I look forward to Richard and Claire Argyle assisting me with their editing.

When out for one of my winter walks along the river bank on December 13th at 3.30pm, I heard the most beautiful bird song, not a song I recognised, I stood quietly, trying to locate the singer, when something caught my attention at the water's edge. What a wonderful sight! It was a dipper; singing his heart out, dipping up and down, a new exciting wildlife watch for me.

I didn't get out walking much in January and February due to the weather and the horrid flu!

In March, our garden gave me a few new visitors lifting my spirit. We were putting out extra food during the snowy, chilly weather and were rewarded with regular visits from our smallest bird - the gold-crest (see photo), busily visiting the feeders. Our Night Sky: Summer 2018 by Chris Heron

This summer, Mars will be at its closest for 15 years (July 27th), but is quite low in the sky so viewing is not at its best. The surface is still being explored by the vehicle 'Curiosity', and the project website has some stunning photos: www.mars.nasa.gov.

If you are just starting to take an interest in the night sky the moon is a great place to begin. Early or late phases show the real detail as the low angle of sunlight throws dramatic shadows over the surface. Avoid looking at the full moon as the moonscape is bleached flat by the sun. Binoculars or a simple telescope will give great views of the mountain ranges, valleys and maria (seas). I was able to make out the rings of Saturn with a child's £50 telescope recently.

Planets visible in the sky this summer include Venus (evening star in April), Mars, Jupiter and Saturn. Mercury always appears close to the Sun and observation requires great care. **NEVER** look at the Sun through binoculars or a telescope as it will cause blindness. Meteor showers to check out are the Eta Aquarids (May 6-7), and the Perseids (July 13 – Aug 26)'

You may not know that locally there are two astronomical societies: Swansea and Preseli. Each runs a programme of interesting talks and sky-watching events. Sky-watching is naturally better in winter (darker sky), so wrap up well if you go to one. Check:


