Introduction and Context

Henllanfallteg is a community (civil parish in England). It is one of the seventy-three Communities that make up the county of Carmarthenshire. It was formed in 1930 mainly by amalgamating the old parishes of Llanfallteg East, Llanfallteg West and Henllan Amgoed and a very small part of Llangan. The current Community Council was created at the same time, with the former council of Llanfallteg and Henllan Amgoed being amalgamated.


The ancient parish of Llanfallteg was at one stage divided between Pembrokeshire and Carmarthenshire as was Llandissilio. The part in Pembrokeshire was Llanfallteg West and the part in Carmarthenshire was Llanfallteg.

The modern Community of Henllanfallteg includes the villages and hamlets of Llanfallteg, Henllan Amgoed, Cwmfelin Boeth, Hiraeth and Rhydywrach. In the April 2003 boundary review a very small part of the Community was taken away from Carmarthenshire and put into Pembrokeshire along with the Community of Clynderwen.

The 2001 census found there were 163 households, with a total population of 423. This broke down to be 101 underage's of 18, 221 18 – 60 and 101 over 60. Just over 52% of the Community population declared they had capability in Welsh.

Henllanfallteg is situated in the far southwestern side of the county of Carmarthenshire which is in the southwest of Wales (UK). Only 2 miles away from the main A40 road, Henllanfallteg is very accessible and relatively easy to find.

Below, is a map outlining the Community borders of Henllanfallteg.



Henllanfallteg Community Council works with the Henllanfallteg Community Association and Playing Field Association to support the local biodiversity including on the playing field, local footpaths, the community centre and park.

Henllanfallteg Community Council does not own its own land which reduces the range of actions within its direct control. It can actively promote services which may have a positive impact on biodiversity, including providing grants for projects in the Council's area. We promote sustainability and biodiversity by pursuing sustainability goals and practices whenever possible.
